- Up to 6 participants will be accepted from Australia and New Zealand through CLAIR Sydney.

- Any expenses prior to arrival in Japan and after departing from Japan shall be borne by participants
- Expenses incurred during the Seminar period in Japan will be borne by CLAIR.

Yamato Takada is home to many historical sites and buildings, which have been protected and cherished by its residents throughout history. Today the city is known for its rich historical atmosphere, however the city worked very hard to overcome the challenge of finding harmony between the heritage conservation and city planning.



Established in 1963, the sister city relationship between Yamato Takada and Lismore, NSW was the first between Australia and Japan. They are continuously deepening their relationship by not only visiting each other but also sharing ideas, such as foreign language programmes and dietary education in schools.

Popular attractions:


Senbonzakura (Beautiful cherry blossom)

In late March to early April along Takada River – Yamato Takada's main river – the *Senbonzakura* offers visitors a breathtaking cherry blossom experience. The *Senbonzakura*, meaning 1,000 cherry trees in Japanese, were planted in 1948 to help comfort the townspeople after the war. In recent years, an esplanade and steppingstones were placed along the Takada River, offering visitors and residents alike a peaceful area of relaxation.



Okaden

Okaden is a stage that sits in the middle of the Onaka pond, which is located in the city's central park. Okaden, which harmoniously blends in its natural surroundings, is one of the most famous and beautiful landmarks of Yamato Takada.



Tsukiyama Kofun is an enormous, 261 meters long burial mound that was built during the 5th century. It is said that Emperor Buretsu is buried in this mound, although the identity of the buried remains a mystery to this day.
