

Ramen Capital Kitakata City



What flavours come to your mind when you hear the words 'Japanese Ramen'? In Japan, there are 3 main types of ramen: Miso Ramen, Tonkotsu Ramen, and Shoyu (Soy Sauce) Ramen. Japanese people often argue about their own taste preferences, for example: "I prefer Miso Ramen over Tonkotsu".

I'd like to introduce you to Kitakata City, a city that is famous for Shoyu Ramen- and is often called the "Ramen Capital". Kitakata City is in Aizu, an area increasingly popular amongst Australian skiers. Aizu is not only a favourite destination for

winter sports enthusiasts, but also for Shoyu Ramen lovers from all over Japan.

The beauty of the clear soy sauce-based broth, and the flavour combination of the broth with the roasted 'chashu' pork toppings draw in customers. One of the most famous ramen restaurants from Kitakata City has opened a branch in the USA, and is receiving excellent online reviews.

Of course it's one thing to dine at internationally famous restaurants, but another great way of enjoying ramen in Kitakata City is to find your own favourite ramen shop, out of the 120 restaurants in the city. Here are some specific tips on how to enjoy Kitakata Ramen when you visit Kitakata City:

1) From Kitakata Station, go to the 'Ramen Shrine'* where a Ramen God is thought to be enshrined! If you like, put your hands together and make a wish to eat delicious Kitakata Ramen.

2) Make sure to pick up a discount coupon at the Ramen Shrine. Also, ask the staff there for their ramen restaurant recommendations!

3) When you arrive at the restaurant of your choice, enjoy a bowl of delicious Kitakata Ramen.

4) If you still have room for more ramen, visit another

restaurant and compare the taste differences between the restaurants.

5) After the ramen, visit a sake brewery. Kitakata City is well-known for its sake. If sake isn't your thing, how about picking up some ice cream?

I'm sure your trip to Kitakata City will be very satisfactory if you follow the steps above! It takes 15 minutes between Kitakata Station and the main station in Aizu (Aizuwakamatsu Station) by train. National Symposium on Japanese Language Education 2018

The National Symposium on Japanese Language Education was held at the University of Technology, Sydney, on 2 and 3 Nov. The symposium is a biennial event held alternatively in Melbourne and Sydney, which makes this year's event the first one in Sydney in four years. This symposium targets Japanese language educators of all educational stages across the entire country, and is the only symposium of its kind in Australia for Japanese language educators to come together.

The theme of this year's event is "Bigger, Broader, Better!", as the symposium hopes to contribute towards the increase of Japanese learners (Bigger), the provision of diverse and innovative programs for students (Broader), and the improvement of the Japanese language educational system in addition to the further development of the skills of educators who support Japanese learners (Better).

It was very remarkable that more than 40 sessions on different topics were held over the two days, topics such as schools that conduct Japanese language classes through Japanese poetry. CLAIR Sydney staff who attended the symposium was impressed by how the symposium participants were proactively asking questions, and was able to witness the intense enthusiasm in Japanese language education in Australia.

World Masters Games 2021 Kansai!

From late October to early November, a delegation from the Organising Committee of the World Masters Games 2021 Kansai was in Australia to promote the World Masters Games 2021 Kansai at the Pan Pacific Masters Games 2018 in Gold Coast. Study Tour at Surf Coast Shire Council

From 14 to 19 Nov, Mr Yuta Watanabe, Assistant Director at CLAIR Sydney, visited Surf Coast Shire Council in Victoria for his study tour on local governments' regional promotion policies.

Surf Coast Shire Council has a population of approximately 30,000 people, and is located 20 kilometres south of Geelong, the second largest city in Victoria. The area is lined with beautiful beaches and boasts large stretches of natural areas. In addition, as the council name implies, the area is a famous surfing spot where two of the biggest surf brands, Rip Curl and

Wakayama Persimmons: Available for the First Time

Ever in Sydney!

The Wakayama Prefectural Government promoted persimmons produced in Wakayama, Japan, in Sydney from 21 to 26 Nov. Wakayama is located south of Osaka in the Kansai region. Persimmon is one of Wakayama's specialties and the prefecture is the top producer of persimmons in Japan. This is the first time that Japanese persimmons have been imported to Australia. A representative from Wakayama promoted Wakayama



persimmons through a seminar to stakeholders from the fresh produce industry. They also promoted the persimmons at local Asian supermarkets directly to customers. Sydneysiders indulged in this sweet, juicy and



exotic fruit!

This first-ever persimmon import was made possible through the collaboration of the following three organisations: the Japan Agricultural Cooperatives Group (JA-Group) Wakayama, JETRO and the Wakayama Prefectural Government. CLAIR Sydney mainly assisted with in-store promotions this time and will continue to assist with their future promotions.

Representatives from Kohoku in Saga Prefecture Visited Australia

Despite Melbourne's weather being so unpredictable, we lucked out with beautiful weather.



- Rugby World Cup 2019 in Japan -

As you may know, the Rugby World Cup 2019 will be held in 12 cities across Japan between 20 Sep and 2 Nov next year. The Japanese people are proud to be hosting this pinnacle event for rugby players around the world. We are also looking forward to welcoming people from all over the world and together with the visitors, enjoy the third largest sporting event in the world after the Summer Olympic Games and the FIFA World Cup.

The match schedules for the All Blacks and the Wallabies are shown below.



The All Blacks and the Wallabies will be playing in a maximum of seven matches spread across 43 days during the competition. As you can see from the above, there is a total of 36 days between the matches, making these days ideal for travelling around Japan as you wait for your team's next match.

If you have already travelled in Japan several times before, you may be comfortable to travel around on your own while you are in Japan for the Rugby World Cup, and purchase the tickets for the games. For those who prefer this option, the second round of public ticket sales start from 19 January 2019 on the official ticketing website: (<u>https://tickets.rugbyworldcup.com/</u>). You can also get useful information on the host cities and touring destinations around the venues on the official website: (<u>https://www.rugbyworldcup.com/cities</u>).

If you are not familiar with travelling in Japan, it may be a good idea to join one of the official supporter tours which include tickets for the games. You may be able to find the most suitable tour for your schedule, and information on other activities and attractions among a wide variety of tour options.
