The World Masters Games 2021 Kansai that was scheduled to be held in May this year has been postponed for a year due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The new dates for the Games are Friday, 13 May-Sunday, 29 May 2022.

The World Masters Games is an international competition where any sports lovers over the age of 30 can compete. The Games will host a total of 59 disciplines in 35 sports, of which seven disciplines in five sports will take place in Wakayama Prefecture: sailing, windsurfing, dance sports, indoor volleyball, rifle shooting, half marathon and 'Ekiden' (long-distance relay running).



Reception Celebrating the Birthday of His Majesty the Emperor of Japan in Cairns



On 5 Mar, a reception celebrating the birthday of His Majesty the Emperor of Japan was held in Cairns. More than 100 guests were invited to the reception, such as representatives from Cairns Regional Council, people engaged in sister city exchange with Japanese cities and Japanese language educators.

CLAIR Sydney ran a booth at the reception to provide general information and tourist destination information on Saitama and Osaka Prefectures, which respectively have sister state relationships with Queensland, and information on upcoming large-scale international sports events in Japan such

as the Tokyo 2020 Olympics and Paralympics Games and the World Masters Games 2021 KANSAI. 2020/2021 CLAIR Forum



On 9 Mar, CLAIR Sydney held the CLAIR Forum 2020/2021 at the Japan Foundation, Sydney, in collaboration with the Institute for Public Policy and Governance at the University of Technology Sydney (UTS: IPPG).

CLAIR Forum is the event for CLAIR Sydney and UTS: IPPG staff and local government representatives to present on and discuss their organisations' strategies and research concerning common challenges faced by local governments in Japan, Australia and New Zealand.

This year's theme was 'Local Government Policies on Industrial Promotion'. At the event, four CLAIR Sydney staff and two guest presenters made a comprehensive presentation each on local government policies and strategies that promote their respective local economies in Japan and Australia. Many meaningful discussions took place during the Q+A sessions.

Amidst the COVID-19 pandemic, although we had to place a limit on the number of participants and requested all participants to wear a mask throughout the event, we received positive feedback from many participants on the day. Some participants expressed that they truly enjoyed taking part in their first in-person event in a really long time.

Ohkuma Tree Planting Ceremony in Bathurst



On 11 Mar, a tree planting ceremony was held in Bathurst to celebrate the 30th anniversary of the sister city relationship between Bathurst and Ohkuma and to commemorate the 10th anniversary of the Great East Japan Earthquake.

The City of Bathurst and Ohkuma Town established a sister city relationship in 1991. Since then, they have been nurturing their strong relationship through people-topeople interactions such as high school student exchange visits. The Ohkuma Town Government originally intended

to send a delegation for an official visit to Bathurst in March but unfortunately had to cancel due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Despite this, the City of Bathurst held a tree planting ceremony in the Ohkuma Japanese Garden on 11 March, 10 years after the Great East Japan Earthquake. In attendance were representatives who have been engaging in the exchange between Bathurst and Ohkuma, the Deputy Consul-General of the Consulate-General of Japan in Sydney and a staff member of CLAIR Sydney. After observing a minute of silence for the victims of the earthquake, Cr Bobby Bourke, Mayor of Bathurst delivered an address to celebrate the ongoing friendship between Bathurst and Ohkuma.

CLAIR Sydney will continue to actively support the sister city exchanges between Australia/New Zealand and Japan.



Memorial Service for the 2011 Great East Japan Earthquake

On 13 Mar, the Japan Exchange and Teaching Programme Alumni Association (JETAA) Canberra, the Canberra Japan Club, and the Australia-Japan Society ACT (Australian Capital Territory) jointly held a memorial service at Canberra Nara Peace Park in commemoration of the 10th anniversary of the Great East Japan Earthquake. A staff from CLAIR Sydney was in attendance at the event. The three organisations have been holding memorial services annually to commemorate the Great East Japan Earthquake around this time of the year, and this year's event was held on a larger scale to mark ten years since the disaster.



The Ambassador of Japan to Australia, Mr YAMAGAMI Shingo, and other representatives made speeches at the event, during which the dynamic interactions between the people of Canberra and the disaster-stricken areas were highlighted. During the event, there were also recitals and performances of Japanese poems and songs by children who are learning Japanese. Following this, the Canberra Rotary Peace Bell in the park was rung and a minute of silence was





observed to honour the victims of the disaster.

Since 2012, the Australia-Japan Society ACT has been playing a central role in the Tohoku Youth Program, which invites students who lost their parents in the Great East Japan Earthquake to Canberra to experience life in Australia for approximately two weeks. For Australia and Japan, Canberra is the significant location for the two countries to share grievous experiences and further the ties between its people.

- Trans-Tasman Travel Bubble -

The trans-Tasman travel bubble that reopens two-way travel between Australia and New Zealand without the previously mandatory 14-days of quarantine has begun in mid-April. This travel bubble is projected to drive positive impacts upon the COVID-19 pandemic recovery in the two countries, such as the resumption of direct people-to-people interactions. Apart from this, I am sure the positive economic contributions generated by this travel bubble are welcomed by many in the two countries.

As described in the CLAIR Sydney Newsletter published in January 2021, compared with most of the world, Australia and New Zealand are in such enviable positions with their achievements in managing the pandemic and combating the COVID-19 virus. I believe that it must be very encouraging for the rest of the world to see the establishment of the trans-Tasman travel bubble between Australia and New Zealand, two of the few countries that have triumphed in their COVID-19 responses.

As you may know, the activities of CLAIR Sydney take place in both Australia and New Zealand. Since late March 2021, our activities in New Zealand have been limited to online-based activities. The establishment of this travel bubble now allows CLAIR Sydney staff to resume our on the ground activities in New Zealand.
